FAST FACTS FROM THE 2015 ZIMBABWE DHS



Percent of married women age 15-49 using family planning

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Two-thirds of women age 15-49 in Zimbabwe use a modern method of family planning. Modern method use has increased since 2010-11.

CHILDHOOD MORTALITY




1 in 15 Zimbabwean children does not survive until their 5th birthday.

Trends in Childhood Mortality


Deaths per 1,000 live births in the 5-year period before the survey

HIV




14% of Zimbabwean adults age 15-49 are HIV positive.
