## Overview

The Republic of Azerbaijan has made significant increases in health expenditure in recent years. The country has also made much progress in providing better HIV prevention, testing, treatment and care services. Azerbaijan is also seeing a steady decline in the total number of tuberculosis cases. The HIV epidemic is concentrated among key populations including people who inject drugs and their partners. One of the goals of the National HIV Strategic Plan is to strengthen civil society organizations to ensure access to HIV testing, prevention and treatment services for key populations.

With Global Fund support, Azerbaijan aims to reduce TB mortality by at least 35 percent and TB incidence by at least 20 percent by 2020 as compared to 2015. The National TB Strategic Plan focuses on strengthening the detection of multidrug-resistant and extensively resistant TB as well as and ensuring treatment effectiveness of all TB cases.
