

YEMEN COVID-19 PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE SNAPSHOT

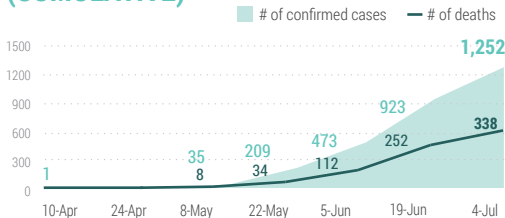
HUMANITARIAN COUNTRY TEAM

As of 4 July, the number of reported confirmed COVID-19 cases in Yemen had reached 1,252 with 338 associated deaths and 539 recoveries. Men constitute 76 per cent of all reported cases and 57 per cent of recorded deaths are aged 45 or above, including 30 per cent aged 60+. In Hadramaut, 409 COVID-19 cases were reported, by far the highest number, with 150 associated deaths and 81 recoveries. This is followed by Aden (267 cases, 32 deaths and 194 recoveries) and Taizz (247 cases, 63 deaths and 114 recoveries), which have recorded higher recovery and lower death rates than Hadramaut. The ongoing fuel crisis continues to threaten access to food, hospital operations and water supplies which are fuel-dependent and crucial to preventing virus transmission and to the response, and presents a further obstacle to people seeking treatment. The cost of the minimum food basket has risen by as much as 35 per cent in some areas since the outbreak of COVID-19 while the Yemeni rial depreciates. Aid agencies continue to work to reduce virus transmission through community engagement; to procure and distribute thousands of metric tons of medical supplies and equipment; to save lives by supporting COVID-19 clinical readiness; and to safeguard the public health care system. However, the Yemen humanitarian response, including for COVID-19, remains hugely underfunded, risking an increase in the spread of COVID-19 and jeopardizing the ability of humanitarian partners to respond.

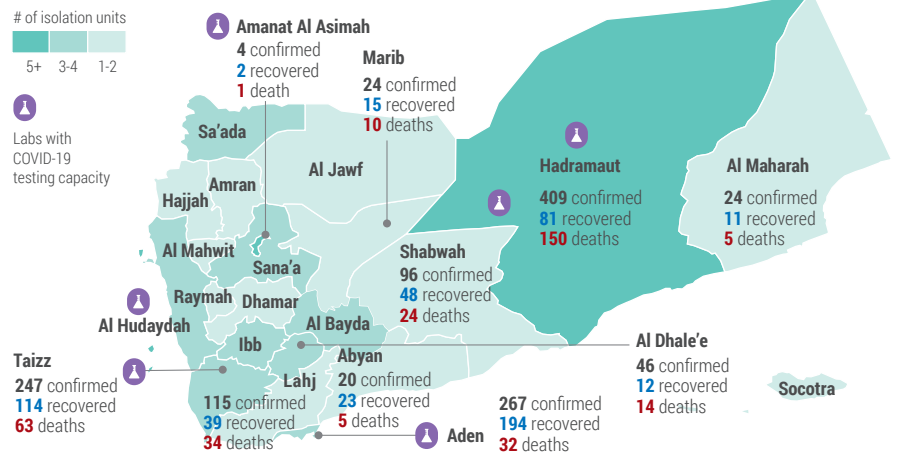

SUPPRESS AND AWARENESS

- **14.5M** people reached via multiple platforms
- Religious leaders raised awareness reaching **3.6M** in 5,000 mosques
- **One million** people were reached via WhatsApp
- **8.5 million** people were reached via **451** mobile cars with megaphones
- **10 million** views of COVID-19 visuals on various social media platforms
- COVID-19 messages sent to **13.5M** subscribers
- **5,600** hotline calls received by Ministry of Public Health and Population
- **14,730** calls received via radio phone-in programmes
- **626,730** people reached in nearly **10,000** community gatherings and over **9,640** women social events
- **2.6 million** people reached via over **450,000** house-to-house visits and mother-to-mother sessions
- **33,980** people reached through **920** awareness sessions in health facilities
- **258,830** people reached via WhatsApp trees managed by community volunteers

SUPPLY CHAIN

- Aid agencies are scaling up logistics and supply capacity.
- **9,221 m3** of supplies have been transported into the country, while **3,349 m3** are in the pipeline. These include:
 - **376** ICU beds
 - **> 600** PCR test kits
 - **28,000** swabs
 - **> 5 million** gloves
 - **> 600,000** masks
 - **8,000** MT of medical supplies in warehouses
 - **> 447** containers with medical supplies at ports ready to be offloaded
 - **24,000** PPE purchased for frontline partners
 - **100,000** reactions in pipeline

Locally procured items:

- **3.6 million** assorted PPEs
- **1,000** oxygen cylinders
- **19** patient monitors
- **10** ventilators
- **8** ICU beds
- **7,502** litres of hand sanitizer

SAVING LIVES

- The UN and partners are urgently expanding hospital capacity in key population centres. This includes establishing **21** new intensive care units (ICUs) in COVID-19 designated hospitals, adding to 38 existing ICUs; deploying two high capacity mobile field hospitals with nearly **100** beds and providing salaries to frontline health care workers.
- **9** isolation centres installed with solar systems and fully operationalized; **2** systems are being installed in **2** more centres

SAFEGUARDING THE PUBLIC HEALTH SYSTEM

- Protecting the public health system at **4,300** non-COVID health care facilities is a priority. These will continue to provide non-COVID health care services to prevent deaths from deadly causes including cholera, diphtheria, dengue and malaria as well as providing nutrition treatment to pregnant women and malnourished children.

- **5,049** number of health facilities (HFs)
- **2,779** number of HFs providing partial or full malaria health services (testing, treatment, referral and follow up)
- **2,528** number of fully functioning HFs
- **1,257** number of HFs providing cholera response services
- **1,865** number of HFs partially functioning
